A Special General Meeting is held every 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday each month at 10.00 a.m. at the Masonic Centre, McIvor Road.

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Our Guest Speakers at today's meeting are Peter and Murial Thornton, from the Probus Club of Kangaroo Flat. The title of their program is "A visit to Beijing China".

Our Guest Speaker in June, Jim Downward, gave us a history lesson on the start of communication by telegraph in Australia.

He told us when John Douall Stuart's epic trek from Adelaide to Arnhem Land proved there was no inland sea. Charles Chas Todd who was Govt Astronomer and Superintendent of Telegraphs in Adelaide, wrote in 1861 "The erection of an overland telegraph line to the North Coast should be regarded as a national work."

He envisaged a link to a cable laid under the sea from Bombay to Batavia and then to Darwin.

The South Australian Government appointed Chas Todd to plan and construct the line from Port Augusta to Darwin. Logistically, it must have been a mammoth task.

The line was to be single No 8 gauge galvanized steel wire, 3200km in all, together with insulators, batteries, relays, all of which had to come from England.

A start was made in September 1870 in Darwin when the 1st pole was erected. Meanwhile stores and drays were to leave in August 1870 for the Centre sections of the line. The size of the contingent can be visualized when you consider that 27 sets of 5 horse heavy harness, 300 collars and over 600 hides were used.

It took 1 year and 11 months to construct. Today's evidence of the repeater station at Barrow Creek, built with solid stone, is a lasting memorial to the determination of Todd and his men. It provides a link with the past to many travelling by road to Darwin with the laying of cables under the sea from Java to Darwin in 1872, messages from the outside world were down to hours compared to 6 months by sea.

All this in morse code, and relayed many times, hence messages took several hours to reach overseas. By 1897 Western Australia was connected to a National Grid. Every 200 miles, a repeater station, manually operated by at least two operators.

When the telegraph station at Darwin suffered a direct hit from one of 64 bombing raids in 1942, the radio link was lost. It is difficult to imagine, that in those critical days the only link left was the original single wire and the use of the morse code equipment which was salvaged. Brings one to realize the great strides in communications that we Probians have experienced in our lifetime.

Jim Downward still uses Morse Code from his home, using a telephone line, a modem and interface equipment. He is regularly in contact Australia wide with 40 enthusiasts all using original keys and relays.

Jim was ably assisted by Peter Shaw who displayed and operated the morse code equipment.

They were introduced by Cliff Binks and thanked by Herb Hesse.

#### A PROFILE

To all those relatively new members, who enjoy the fellowship of our Club, I wonder if they know who was responsible in forming our Club. He was also our first President and the person you meet each meeting with a hearty welcome and a handshake, known as our 'Badger'. He is one of the few of us who can put a name to everyone in our Club.

Ray Downey has been the driving force to form groups of people to provide fellowship and friendship in this city and beyond.

I refer to his tireless energy by his involvement in the Charter of the Rotary Club of Bendigo-Strathdale and the Probus Clubs of Corowa, Eaglehawk, Bendigo Ladies, Sandhurst, Kangaroo Flat, White Hills, and Spring Gully.

His energy could be attributed to an induced E.M.F. (Electro-motive force) due to his close association in controlling High Voltage Systems at S.E.C. installations - so here is a brief history of Ray Downey's career.

Born at Wallace near Ballarat, Ray was educated at the Wallace State School, Ballarat Junior Technical School and later the Ballarat School of Mines where he gained Diplomas in Electrical and Mechanical Engineering.

First employment was at Ronaldson Bros. and Tippett Engineering works in Ballarat from 1932-36.

In 1936 joined the S.E.C. as an electrical operator, working at Terminal Stations at Yarraville, Richmond and Brunswick and in the System control room as Assistant System Supervisor.

Transferred to the Electrical Supply Department and had a period with the Metropolitan Branch before transferring to Ballarat as Assistant Distribution Engineer. After a short period at Horsham as the first S.E.C. engineering officer, appointed to the Wimmera area (where he first met Jack Watts) was appointed

Distribution Engineer at Bendigo from 1956-59. During this period Allan Court and Ray were opening bowlers for Kennington in the Churches cricket competition.

Next move was to Mildura as Manager. It was there he joined Rotary. Four years at Mildura 1959-63 was followed for similar periods at Castlemaine and Colac before the final move back to Bendigo in 1971.

And there's more: Ray is a Past President of the then Home and Hospital for the Aged, a Council member of what was the White Hills Technical College and inaugural Treasurer of Strathaven. For his service to the Community, he was nominated as Citizen of the Year in 1987 in the then, Shire of Strathfieldsaye. As a dedicated Rotarian, he was elected District Governor for the year 1977-78. Truly a great record of community service.
