DR. WESLEY BLACKMORE, who will be our Guest Speaker at today's meeting, has had a great diversity of interesting experiences in the field of education. While his academic career and professional qualifications are relevant to the Melbourne University, he has lectured in the U.S.A., United Kingdom, Japan, and for two years, 1982 and 1983, in the Peoples Republic of China. Together with this. Wes Blackmore is also the author of thirteen books. Following his retirement he was again called to China in 1988 where he remained for a period of three years before returning to Australia and taking up residence in Bendigo recently. Wes will relate some of his impresssions of China today in his talk entitled "Communism - Capitalism and Courage in Contemporary China".

The Speaker at the May Meeting was the Chief Executive Officer of Strathfieldsaye Shire, MR. BARRY EDWARDS. After CYRIL MICHELSEN's introduction, Barry proceeded to give a few answers to the question - "Did You Know?" Municipal government is the third tier, below the Federal and State governments and hence is closer the people. The two higher tiers tend to forget local government. One third of Strathfieldsaye Shire is State Forest, and consequently yields no income in the form of rates. The Shire's yearly budget was \$10 million, of which \$1.6 million was payroll. The remaining moneys were devoted to many activities; fire hazard eradication \$35,000, Home Help \$250,000, Meals On Wheels, garbage collection, and so on. Garbage disposal is a problem in the Bendigo area as it is everywhere. The use of the Eaglehawk tip, the last remaining in the area, costs \$120,000. When this tip is no longer

usable, the next tip will be 20 kms outside city limits, and planning permission for it has spread over 8 years. The electric power for street lighting costs the Shire \$88,000 a year, paid to S.E.C. The total Rating income at present is \$5.5 million, from the lowest rates in the Bendigo area. In the 1970's and 1980's, under the Whitlam and Fraser governments, Government grants were good; but the present Federal and State Governments believe that local governments have been treated too well. Over the last 20 years the population of Strathfieldsaye has increased 500%. In local government council elections candidates have no afiliation to the political parties, and it is to be hoped they never will. Shire Council meets every 3 weeks, and there is an agenda running to 100 pages for each; being a Councillor takes much time and commitment on the part of the incumbent. The Council sets policy and the professional staff implements it. A 5 year plan for capital waworked out aiming at the Shire being debt free in 1993. The debt free state has already been achieved, and a Capital Works Reserve is being built up. Council sent out a Questionnaire to rate payers which produced a good response. Environment protection was the main point of concern in the responses. Amalgamation with other local authorities is not popular. Mr. Edwards ended his talk by quoting Abraham Lincoln's; "Eight Cannots" he may have given them over 100 years ago, but they are still very relevant.

JOHN ALISTAIR KENNETH MC LEAN

Alistair was born at Naracoorte, S.A., on August 2nd. 1912, the eldest son of Rev. R.W. and Mrs. McLean. He was educated at St. Andrew's College, Naracoorte and at the Primary and High Schools, Bacchus Marsh and at the Geelong College.

In 1931 he entered Ormond College at Melbourne University where he remained as a student until 1937. He graduated with the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity. During 1934 Alistair was Assistant at the Erskine Mission, Carlton and on December 21st. 1937 was licensed to preach the gospel.

He served at Stanley, Tasmania, and Chelsea before being cal to Cobden where he was ordained as a Minister of the Word on March 14th. 1940.

On August 2nd. 1942 he married Elizabeth (Betty) Cromie at the Canterbury Presbyterian Church. During 1944 they lived in Melbourne while Alistair studied part of Dip. Ed, was teaching Religious Education in schools and was Assistant at St. Stephen's in Caulfield. For much of his ministry Alistair conducted up to six or more periods of R.E. weekly and was engaged in many facets of youth work.

At the end of 1944 they moved to Benalla where they stayed until 1961. From then they were in the Bacchus Marsh - Melton parish and from 1971 to 1975 at Elmore. On January 5th. 1975 they came to Bendigo and have been active members of St. Andrews Church ever since.

Alistair acted as a Probation Officer in Benalla and Bacchus Marsh for 25 years. For the last 18 years he has regularly visited the Bendigo Hospital, the Anne Caudle Centre and Mt. Alvernia and various Special Accommodation Houses on behalf of the Uniting Churcu.

Alistair and Betty have two sons - lan, who is National Sales Manager for a division of B.T.R. INDENG, HUFCOR, Architectural Products Division, and Murray who is Consul General for Australia in Shanghai.

They are both involved in musical pursuits and enjoy reading, bowls and golf.

At the ANNE CAUDLE CENTRE a mini shopping and recreation centre has been opened, named the N.B. PERRIN CENTRE in honour of our member BRUCE, who was the Chief Executive Officer of the establishment for 14 years.
