TASMANIA TOUR

April 26 - May 4, 2006

We embanked, 39 Probus members with wives and partners, together with friends of Probus, on the Spirit of Tasmania after the journey down from Bendigo with Bendigo Coachlines under Coach Captain, Neville Dewhurst.

We arrive in Devonport at 7am, boarded the Coach and travelled to Sheffield for breakfast.

During the tour we spent several hours on the water. Besides the two crossings of Bass Strait we had a pleasant cruise on the Tamar River with Captain Nick giving us a humourous and informative commentary while navigating single handed.

Later on day 7, we joined a World Heritage Cruise from Strahan. Our first visit was to Hell's Gate, the habour entrance. Here we had some slightly boisterous seas although nothing like the Southern Ocean which we viewed from the harbour entrance.

We turned around and proceeded along the south-east shore to reach the Gordon River. Passing through the gorges, where the river flows through steep, densly-wooded slopes with myrtle, Huon Pine and various other species, we arrived at Heritage Landing. Here a wooden walk-way gives easy access to the Myrtle Rain Forest with sights of ancient Huon Pine.

Lunch was serve aboard and we returned to the harbour for a conducted tour of Sarah Island, which was Tasmania's first penal settlement.

The next day, day 8, we travelled back to Strahan for a trip on the West Coast Wilderness Railway which winds it s way through the rain forest following close to the King River up the King River Gorge. This is a magnificent spectacle and the train gives an excellent view.

We had lunch on the train and had to change to the train with a locomotive equiped with rack and pinion gear. This took us over the ridge to Queenstown where the coach was waiting to take us back to Devonport and the Spirit of Tasmania on which we returned to Melbourne.

We disembanked at 7am and took an early breakfast at MacDonald's on the Ring Road. After breakfast we had to return to the Spirit to pick up some items of luggage which had been left behind. As a result we arrived back in Bendigo over an hour later than the scheduled time.

The accommodation at all our stays was good, particularly the food for breakfast and dinner. At the dinner on Day 6 we had two Guest Speakers, Noleen Bradshaw who is the leading spirit in the Museum at Queenstown and Len Craig, a retired railway man, who recounted some of his amusing epxeriences. We took the opportunity to congratulate Mr and Mrs Dingle on their approaching Diamond Wedding.

No tour is complete without some incidents, and sure enough we had them. One gentleman had lunch at a cafe then went to the toilet. 1.00pm: Lunch, followed by afternoon tour of world famous Coonawarra wine growing region.

6.30pm: Return to Little Lodge for Dinner and an evening of relaxation.

Day 3: Thursday 26th October: (B/L)

8.00am: Breakfast.

9.00am: Deport for our tour of the Malleefowl Sanctuary. This is a protected habitat which provides a rare opportunity to see these mound building birds in the wild. Over the years Whimpey has developed a unique relationship with established breeding birds, which enables viewing at close hand. Remember, these are totally wild birds so you have to be very quiet and patient.

12.00pm: Light Lunch at the Lodge before departure journey to Bendigo, arriving home approx 5.30pm.
