Hugh described Port Moresby as "a seedy, run down town". There are huge problems arising from the "Rascals".

A final pronouncement from one resident "In twenty years time this will belong to Indonesia".

LES NANKIVELL thanked Hugh, and made the ususal presentation.

At the August Meeting we had a new member inducted. ALAN MICHELSEN, CYRIL'S son, was inducted by Cyril. The new member was presented with a Probus Badge and a copy of the Constitution. ALBIE COOPER supported Cyril in a short speech.

As members are aware we thought that this was a unique event in Probus history, to have a father and son both in the same Probus Club. Norm Phillips began his education at the North Bendigo State School and then at the Bendigo Technical School. On leaving school he worked as an office boy at the Farmers and Citizens Trustees Company in the Commonwealth Bank building on View Point Bendigo, and commenced studying Accountancy at the Bendigo Business College under Jimmy Cox.

He worked as a clerk at the Trustees until 1942 when he enlisted in the Army and from then until 1946 he served in the A.I.F. in "ew Guinea and the Solomon Islands.

On returning to Bendigo after the war he obtained a position as a clerk at the Bendigo Base Hospital. Over the years he completed his studies in Accountancy and Hospital Administration, and was promoted, being appointed Manager and Secretary of the Hospital in 1964 and held that position until his retirment in 1986.

He was recently honoured by the Hospital Board when the new kitchen and linking building at the hospital was named "The Norman Phillips Wing".

He has a family of three children and eight grand children. Daughter Helen lives in Narooma on the New South Wales south coast (one of the best golf courses in Australia is an added attraction at Narooma). Son Raymond lives in Melbourne and son Carl is a resident of Bendigo.
